(All exhibits are attached to the original transcript.)

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- A. I began as a public defender with Peter Welch and Donald Graham in, oh, I think came to work for them in September of '79, admitted in March of '80, and now Peter's been elected, Donald's retired, and I'm last man standing. So 38 years and I would say that, you know, for the past 25 or 30 that captures the description.
- Q. Okay, and during the course of this practice you met John J. McDonald; is that correct?
 - A. That's correct.
 - Q. And when did you first meet John?
- A. Precise date not known. He was an associate broker -- I don't really know whether he was a broker or just a salesman, I'm not sure what his licensing status was, and that was probably 30 years or so ago. He was affiliated with Montshire Properties at the time, and I would occasionally be involved with them to assist in real estate transactions and that was my first encounter.
- Q. Okay, and were you in touch with him regularly over the last 30 years?
 - A. No.
 - Q. All right.
- A. There came a time -- not sure exactly when -- when he moved from the area. I gather he used to live in Stratford, Vermont. I might have handled a transaction when he sold that, no idea exactly when that was, and then

I don't know 15 years, 20 years went by with little or no contact. I don't believe I saw him.

- Q. All right. Did you have any contact with any other members of John J. McDonald's family or was it just John?
 - A. No. I believe never. None.
- Q. Okay. So no other contact other than with John J?
- A. And except for his mother Eleanor, that's correct.
- Q. Right. So when did John J. McDonald contact you about issues related to his mother?
- A. Early in 2015. I think there is a telephone call in February or so.
- Q. And do you recall what he wanted when he first called?
- A. He was trying to arrange his mother's affairs. He specifically wanted to arrange for a deed that transferred title to the house. There were some bank accounts. He was looking to avoid probate and explained he wanted to discuss with me what the options and possibilities might be to do that.
- Q. Okay. Now earlier this year -- or actually I guess it was late last year you sent us a copy of your file pursuant to the Probate Court's order.

- A. I think it was June or so of '16.
- Q. And I have marked notes -- what I believe are your office notes as exhibit 1 with some highly sophisticated subnumbering in the lower right-hand column there. I thought it would be helpful if we could go through these notes. Some of them I didn't see dates on them.
 - A. No not necessarily.
- Q. So on the first page, for example, it says

 John McDonald will call. Wants to talk on couple things.

 Looks like maybe the time there 4:20?
- A. Yes. That's the time of day not a date and my assistant didn't happen to date that well usually because there are just the two of us in the office now.
- Q. Okay.
 - A. And so there isn't the opportunity for any more confusion than I can create and this very possibly was February or so.
- 19 Q. So whose handwriting is that?
 - A. That's the handwriting of my assistant.
- 21 Q. And what is her name?
 - A. Jill Chase.
- Q. Okay. Thanks, and then on the next page 1-2
- 25 A. That was part of what I delivered to you

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- because it was in my file.
- Q. Okay.
- What 8 p.m. some day next week might have referred to I don't know except I know I did not do that. There was no nighttime or evening meeting.
- Perhaps retrieved from a voice mail. Is that possible without speculating?
 - I don't recall. Α.
 - Q. Okay. Is that Jill's handwriting also?
- 10 Yes it is. Α.
- Okay. The next page is 1-3 and whose writing 11 Q. is that? 12
- 13 This is my writing. Α.
- Okay, and what's the purpose of the content of 14 Q. these notes? 15
 - As I recall this is at some time after John and I had our initial conference a deed had been drafted and sent to him, and these were instructions for where I might meet him up here for a face-to-face meeting with John and his mother.
- Do you have any idea when those notes might 22 have been taken?
 - When these notes would have been taken? Α.
- 24 Q. Yes.
- 25 I guess I know only that, you know, I met with Α.

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them in late June or so of 2015 and I'm presuming this is just a couple of days before that meeting occurred as he was giving me instructions.

- Q. Okay. Where was he giving you instructions to?
- A. I was going to meet him in this Shaw's supermarket parking lot because I'm not intimately familiar with every address hereabout. I know his intention was not to go to his home but to go to a nearby church that was their family church.
- Q. Okay, and then the next page is 1-4. Looks like this is actually dated February 13, '15?
- A. I think that's a note probably from a voice mail.
- 15 Q. Okay.
- 16 A. That is my writing.
 - Q. Okay. The next page is 1-5. Looks like it's dated February 17, 2015?
- 19 | A. It is.
 - Q. And what would these be the notes of?
- A. These are notes from my initial interview with John.
 - Q. Where did that take place?
- 24 A. At my office I believe.
- 25 Q. Okay, and in reviewing these notes do you

recall the substance of your conversation with John J. McDonald that day?

- A. It was a general conversation about what is it you want me to do; is it you wish me to represent.

 Represent my mom. She wasn't there with him at the time.

 I had my usual inquiry about okay mom's not here, how is she doing, and as you see well she's 91. She's old, feeble, but doing okay, and I am sure as I always do inquired well does she do okay enough to know who she is, know who you are, know what's up, understand what's going on; and yes. He explained that he had a power of attorney from 2011 that empowered him. I hadn't seen it at the time. I asked for a copy to be sent to me, and then we discussed, as you see, notes about generally what was there and what is -- what the options might be for a deed which was the principal focus of the meeting.
- Q. Did I hear you say he wanted you to represent Eleanor?
- A. Yes. I considered Eleanor to be my client. I didn't think it was my job to achieve John's objective rather her objective, though they seemed to be aligned.
- Q. Okay, but she did not accompany John to this meeting?
 - A. Not to that meeting. No, sir.
 - Q. Okay. There's a line that says mother -- is

that EFM -- now sole record owner?

- A. Where are you looking?
- Q. I'm sorry. Right here.
- A. McDonald who is now the sole owner of the property at 4 Vine Street. Notice up above it said that his father, Eleanor's husband, had passed not all that long ago. October of 2014.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. He did not have a deed with him at the time so I asked him to get me some info.
- Q. Okay, and looks like he may have gone through some of the assets that his mother had?
- A. Yes and that's as much as I knew; checking account with this, what is there, what's to be dealt with, car, real estate, checking account, and what he described as a life insurance policy.
- Q. Okay, and then at the bottom you've written John's objectives?
- A. Uh-huh.
 - Q. And just for the transcript it's important to say yes or no.
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Okay, and so John's objective were for all to go to him and avoid probate; is that right?
- 25 A. Correct.

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- Q. Okay, and then you've got a note below that if
 you could help me translate under John's objectives mom's
 bank accounts?

 A. To be joint and survivor.

 O. Personal property. Living trust.
 - Q. Personal property. Living trust.A. And I never saw that. I was told that it

- 10 A. And that is I, CRM, and no task for me.
 - Q. Okay, and then real estate either present deed outright, joint tenants with right of survivorship deed, or lady bird deed?
 - A. Correct.
 - Q. And did you describe those different options to John?
- 17 A. Yes I did.
 - Q. And what's the purpose of a lady bird deed?
 - A. Much debated, isn't it? It's really a

 Medicaid avoidance device, but it's to create a contingent

 remainder in grantee, usually children, that would vest

 upon the death of the grantor but have a revocability

 feature to it so that the grantor, commonly the elder

 parent, retains control.
 - Q. Primarily to avoid Medicaid possible

penalties?

- A. Yes in order -- though I don't pretend deep expertise at Medicaid planning, know enough to know to call someone who does if I need something deep, but to avoid the look back period. It's a gift that does not trigger transfer -- that does not trigger a look back for ineligibility.
- Q. So at the end of this meeting looks like John

 J. McDonald will get back to you with his -- with the deed

 choice -- is that what that says -- or deed chore?
- A. He would discuss it with his mom and he didn't have any copy and had explained to me that his dad had passed and I said well I haven't seen the deed. I haven't done the title. We probably had a discussion about whether there were mortgage encumbrances on it or not, and you need to get me a copy of it for me to be able to draft. You need to get me information, addresses, Social Security numbers, and let me know what you want to do, and then I'll try and help you out.
- Q. Okay. The next page is 1-6. Looks like it's dated maybe April 17, 2015?
 - A. Yes. Correct.
 - Q. And is this your handwriting?
- A. Yes it is, and they appear to be telephone conversation notes and this was, I take it, John's

expression of his election to please prepare a joint tenancy with right of survivorship deed from mom to mom and me, John, and I'm sure the conversation went on okay I'm going to do a recording letter for you. Also if we're going to do this deed, I want to know whether the job got finished. So I'm going to send something up so that if you execute this deed, take this letter to the city clerk when you record it because that letter will instruct the clerk to send the deed back to me. I'll know the loop is closed. I'll send it back to you.

- Q. Did he explain to you why he chose the joint tenants with right of survivorship option?
- A. I don't recall precisely. I can imagine, but I don't know.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. I will volunteer that I think it was less intrusive for him. He was very attentive. He seemed, you know, very concerned about his mother's health and welfare and there's something less of a confrontation with mortality to do a deed to me and my son than to just give it up.
- Q. Okay. Is that something that John expressed to you or is this just --
- A. I can't say with precision. I believe so.
- 25 Q. Okay.

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- A. I am not certain.
- Q. Okay, and then why choose that option over the lady bird deed?
- A. I think he thought that there was no likelihood that she was going to receive extended care in a facility because he was dedicated to providing her care for however long it might take. He had been caring for her in the home. Described himself as her caregiver and intended to continue.
- Q. All right. The next page is 1-7. It looks like it's dated June 15 maybe?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And what do these -- are these in your handwriting?
 - A. This is my handwriting.
- Q. And what do these notes indicate?
- 17 A. An intention to set up an appointment.
 - Q. Okay, and I recall a part of the conversation because John is looking to arrange an appointment at the time. I don't think it was clear whether he and his mom would come to my office or just what or whether I might go up to Burlington, and I am sure, because I recall clearly, that I explained to him that that seems a bit wasteful to have me come to Burlington and to have you incur that expense. The city is full of lawyers. There must be

someone who can attend to this, and he was insistent no he wanted to stick with doing work with me.

- Q. Okay, and it wouldn't even require a lawyer, would it, just someone to notarize the document?
 - A. True enough.
- Q. Okay, but he was insistent that you come to Burlington to execute that?
- A. Well I don't want to put too hard a line under insistent. That was his choice.
- Q. Okay. There's a notation to avoid Mondays I think?
 - A. No idea why. That is correct it does say that. Just a note made at the time two years ago. I have no memory of what it was about Mondays.
 - Q. And do you know what the 545 reference is to?
- 16 | A. No.
 - Q. And then a notation maybe Thursday and want to get done. Does that refresh your recollection?
 - A. John wants to get the job done. Thursday is a day of the week that is possible and I don't recall whether we set up a date at this time.
 - Q. Okay. All right. The next page is 1-8. Whose handwriting is this?
- 24 A. This is mine.
 - Q. And it looks like it's dated January 22nd of

2016?

- A. That's correct.
- Q. And was this a phone conference with John J.

 McDonald?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Okay, and what did you talk about?
 - A. At this point, if my memory serves correctly and the deed would speak, this joint tenancy with right of survivorship deed had been executed some months back. I was surprised it hadn't been recorded or anything, but nothing deep had happened to trip my memory about it, but he says he's ready to record it and I apparently inquired, as my item two there, are you certain that there's evidence of your father's death in the office of the Burlington City Clerk because anybody looking at title will want to see how it is that your mother is the sole owner, and he apparently checked that out.
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. He wants to get this done and record.
 - Q. Did he tell you why the deed hadn't been recorded as of January of 2016?
 - A. No. My memory is that there was a time -- you know this is nearly a year after the first encounter in this particular file, and I think there was a point at which he said no do another deed now to just get it

outright to me, and all right I'll do a deed from you and your mom because we did one already that put it into your joint names to you and sent it to you, though I don't believe anything was ever done with that instrument and the election was to record the joint tenancy with right of survivorship deed.

- Q. Okay.
- A. At this point I met Eleanor McDonald, oh, I would say at least a couple of times.
 - Q. Prior to January of 2016?
- 11 | A. Yes.
- 12 | Q. Okay.
 - A. I mean I think you know that. There's evidence in the file.
- 15 Q. Well you met her in June of 2015?
- 16 | A. Yes.
 - Q. Right. Other than that occasion had you seen her again prior to this January 22nd, 2016 note?
 - A. I believe so. I think my records and billing records might refresh my recollection. I brought nothing with me, but there was certainly our meeting up here and then there were at least two or three other meetings with Eleanor at my office, and seems to me one of them may have been in the fall.
- 25 Q. Okay.

- A. And then there was another one probably subsequent to this.
 - Q. And that would be reflected in your billing records?
 - A. Yes, although I wasn't interested in trying to advance my retirement off of this particular arrangement. She was a delightful elderly lady. Obviously enfeebled. Not long for this world. So I wasn't looking to churn it too much and whether I made out a time slip for everything I did or not I don't recall.
 - Q. Okay. Do you know what the notation is about April on page 1-8?
 - A. Probably my note that something to the effect of we prepared that deed in April. This is the April deed that you're talking about, John. This is just my idle scratching while I'm talking on the phone.
 - Q. All right.
 - A. But this was a reference to, I would say, a past April of 2015. Not to a future date.
 - Q. Okay, and then a notation about the home equity loan?
 - A. I have no recollection whatsoever.
 - Q. Did John tell you why he wanted to have the deed outright to him at this point as opposed to leaving it as joint tenants?

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On more than one occasion he described to me 1 2 the need to try to control the environment at home. There 3 was some tension. I guess his sisters, whom I believe were named Patty and Gail, would come and visit mom and it 4 5 was upsetting to her, John described, and he described 6 that after they would leave she would complain, and it 7 would -- I don't know how long were these stays, but I've never been to the house, but he wanted to be able to tell 8 9 them to leave, but without being the owner he didn't feel 10 he had the right to do that. He knew he didn't have the right to do that, and his mother, he told me, would make 11 12 comments to him after these visits; you know that's the 13 problem here there's no man around here, and she wanted 14 John to stand up and control it and tell them to leave and 15 I'm done now and that wasn't happening. So I think that 16 was what he was wrestling with.

- Q. All right, and this is all as related by John, correct?
 - A. That's correct.
- Q. Okay, because you didn't have any conversations like that with Eleanor, did you?
 - A. I did not.
- Q. And on page 1-9, the next page, these -- is this your handwriting?
- 25 A. It is.

- 1 Okay. It appears to be dated April 22nd of Q. 2 2016? 3 Correct. Α. And this has reference to a -- do you know if 4 Q. 5 this is in reference to a phone call or an office visit? 6 Α. This is a phone call. 7 Okay, and what -- was John calling you? Q. 8 Α. Yes. 9 Q. And what was he calling about? 10 Well from the text of my notes it appears to Α. be another recitation of the circumstance I just 11 12 described --13 Q. Okay. -- that mom was feeling overwhelmed by visits 14 15 and she wants to see them one at a time, and there's some 16 history camped up in here, but I think this is after there had been a visit around Easter time. His sisters or 17 18 sister, I don't know whom, which one of them had called the police and so on. 19 20 There's a reference about there's -- sis got revocation of POA in mail? 21 22 Α. Yes. 23
 - Q. Do you know what that refers to?
 - I mentioned too that John had a power of Α. attorney dated 2011 and he had, oh, I think a year before

this faxed me a copy of it. He was -- and we had since executed a new power of attorney because some bank wanted to see an original and the attorney who had prepared the original, O'Brien somebody, was no longer in business up here so he wasn't able to facilitate that. We did a new power of attorney.

I'm guessing only that he had taken it to the bank and then at least was the first time that I discovered there was another power of attorney and he asked what needs to be done to revoke that. Mom doesn't want that. This is his recitation to me. I need a writing, something clear and unequivocal, that revokes it and I think I recall at a meeting with Eleanor signing and notarizing the revocation letter which was short and sweet. John drafted, I did not, but it was -- I told him it doesn't need to run on in length. Say what you want to do and make it clear, and then you need to deliver notice of that to the agent that was empowered. I guess he sent it out in the mail and that tipped over some anxieties with his sisters.

- Q. Okay. The notes indicate that John was a little unclear about why he is calling me today?
- A. That's an unusual editorial note of mine. It just seemed like he was anxious, but there wasn't any particular objective to it other than to call and seek

counsel, and at some point I told him well I'm not really your attorney. I'm not in a position to tell you what you need to do to protect your circumstance here. That's awkward. I'm sorry, but what happened when the police came. I don't recall anything about the substance of that conversation given the passage of time.

- Q. Okay, but you were clear with John that you were not his attorney?
 - A. Yes I think I was.
- Q. Okay.
- A. Yeah. It's always been an opening salvo of mine. Yeah. Multiple clients all around this table because there will come a time, even if I don't see it now, when that will become awkward. So --
- Q. Okay. The next page is 1-10. This looks like it's referencing your visit with Walter Decker from Adult Protective Services?
 - A. Correct.
 - Q. The last page was 1-11 and it doesn't appear to be dated, but I don't know if that note means anything to you. Is that from your assistant?
- A. Well I think it is dated and given what I recall about its place in the file --
- 24 | Q. Okay.
- 25 A. -- John McDonald had called. I called back

May 5, 2016, May 9, 2016, and he didn't have any e-mail or anything and it said, as the note says, his mailbox was full. So I can't leave any message to let him know that I called back, and I have no idea if that's a landline or a cell.


- Q. Okay. So those are all the notes that I have from your file. Do I appear to be missing anything major that you know of?
- A. No. This was to my assistant here copy this thing.
- Q. Okay.
- A. It doesn't have to be pretty. It just is what it is.
 - Q. Okay. I do have your invoices that I have marked as exhibit 2. I'm looking at the first page which I have marked as 2-1 and the date is -- the entry date is February 17th of 2015; meet here with John to discuss legal and tax issues for plan of succession with property of Eleanor F. McDonald, and we reviewed the notes from that meeting I believe?
 - A. I believe we did.
 - Q. Okay, and that was at your office again?
- A. Yes it is.
 - Q. Okay, and the bill was sent to John McDonald at his po box?


- A. That was the address for both of them. That was, I think, his mother's address as well.


 Q. Is that what he told you?


 A. Yes he did.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. It was also the address that was used for both parties on the property transfer tax return as I recall.
- Q. Okay. Do you know whether Eleanor McDonald was receiving mail directly at the house at 4 Vine Street?
 - A. I have no way of knowing that.
- Q. The next page is 2-2. Looks like an invoice statement dated March 26th of 2015. Again mailed to John McDonald at PO Box 162.
 - A. That's what it says.
- Q. Okay. The next page 2-3 looks like a payment history form and payment received April 13, 2015 in the amount of \$286; is that right?
- A. Appears to be what it says. I think the document speaks.
- Q. Do you know who paid that and what form it was received?
- A. I don't, but believe that from time to time I recall seeing checks that were signed by John, but I don't open the checks, I don't put the checks in the bank. I occasionally see them, but I don't inspect every payment.

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- 31 Okay, and then the last invoice that I have is 1 2 2-10. Looks like it reflects a telephone conference with 3 John on March 30th and a meeting with John and Eleanor to notarize the letter revoking the power of attorney for 4 Patricia? 5 That's right. 6 Α. 7 Q. And that would have been on March 30th, correct? 8
 - Α. That's what it says.
 - Q. Okay.
 - No that's not what it says. Α.
- 12 Q. Okay.
 - Perhaps it is. Telephone conferences 28th and Α. 29th and the date of my time slip was apparently March 30, 2016.
 - Okay. So do you know if you had telephone conferences with John on both the 28th and the 29th?
 - Α. That's what it says.
 - Okay, and do you know when the meeting was Q. with John and Eleanor to notarize the letter?
 - Apparently on or about the 30th. I guess if there's a letter notarized, the date of my signature would then speak for itself.
 - Okay. The next entry on 2-10 is March 31, Q. 2016 about the long telephone conference with John

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regarding issues with his sisters' visits. Is that something that we discussed when we were going through your office notes?

- A. I don't recall that being among the dates --
- Q. Right.
- A. -- that we discussed there and that's entirely possible. These conversations would happen. It seems to me they were more frequent around this time and it was listen and it would go on at some length. There may have been no reason to make notes because there was no new news.
- Q. Okay because my recollection is that the notes discussing that were dated in April; April 22nd?
- A. Then certainly that must have been a different conversation because that's not March 31st.
- Q. Okay. I didn't receive any billing invoices subsequent to this March 3rd, 2016 -- or, I'm sorry, May 3rd, 2016 invoice on 2-10. Do you know if there would be subsequent bills after that?
 - A. Not that I know of.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. I haven't tried to be prepared for a quiz that I would get a grade on here. It is just what my memory serves me here. So this is what Jill retrieved and this is what was sent.

All right. Fair enough. I just wanted to go 1 Q. 2 through some of the correspondence that you sent as well. Exhibit 4 could you identify that? What is that? 3 Appears to be a letter signed by John saying 4 5 we received it April 21, 2015. Okay, and he's enclosing a copy of the 6 7 warranty deed by which his parents --8 Α. It appears so. 9 -- got title, and the purpose of that was to Q. 10 draw up a deed for John J. McDonald and Eleanor F. McDonald as joint tenants with rights of survivorship? 11 12 Α. Right. This would supply property description 13 to me. 14 Q. Okay. So that you could prepare that deed, 15 correct? 16 Yes. Α. 17 Okay, and this is from John, right? Q. 18 Α. It says it is. Okay. I'm going to show you exhibit 3 and 19 Q. 20 They are not in order. If I'm not mistaken, exhibit 5. it looks like exhibit 5 is the final version of exhibit 3 21 22 maybe because there are some things that you added. I 23 don't want to put words in your mouth, but does that --24 just because on the second page of exhibit 5 it looked

like there were instructions for the property transfer tax

- A. It looks that way that there was the possibility this was going to be done remotely. So I was expanding on the instructions in the original draft.
 - Q. All right.
 - A. I doubt both were sent --
- Q. Okay.
 - A. -- but I don't know.
 - Q. So I mean exhibit 3 was dated April 21, 2015 and exhibit 5 is dated April 27, 2015. So it's possible they were just both sent?
 - A. It's my habit to prepare some correspondence at the time I'm preparing a deed and then to speak with the client after the job is done and what are we going to do now, and maybe after I learned more about what he planned to do I expanded my letter.
- Q. Okay, and this was directed to John -- both of these letters, correct?
- A. That's what they say.
 - Q. Okay. Exhibit 6 is that something that your office received from John McDonald?
 - A. It appears so.
 - Q. Is the date --
- 24 A. That is my fax number.
- 25 Q. -- September 22nd of 2015 and do you know the

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purpose of this correspondence?

- A. This appears to be among the openers to his request to prepare a new power of attorney.
- Q. Okay. Showing what the Bank of America needed to process the documents?
- A. It's -- Bank of America wrote the letter. I'm not going to tell you why they were writing it or what they needed. I know John had a power of attorney, but have no idea because I never saw the original. So I don't know where it is or what they had or what they -- what or why they needed it.
- Q. Okay, and did he explain to you why they needed it? Did John explain to you?
- A. This was consistent with his desire to avoid the probate, at least get his name jointly on some bank accounts, but I never oversaw any of that, but I presume he was down there trying to do some banking with his mother's account, but that's presumption only.
- Q. Okay. Exhibit 7 is this another fax from John McDonald to you?
 - A. It appears to be.
 - Q. And what is he sending you with this fax?
- A. Apparently what's attached to it which is a copy of a power of attorney.
 - Q. The power of attorney that was executed back

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in 2011?

- A. It says that. I wasn't present. I didn't draw it. I don't know.
 - Q. Right, but do you remember getting this from John?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Okay, and do you know why he would be sending you this?
 - A. Probably because I asked him to.
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. Why are you being questioned about this power of attorney. You told me you had a power of attorney. You mentioned that in our first encounter and I probably asked, don't remember, but send me that. I want to see it.
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. So he was finally doing that because what problem do we have to solve here? Is there something wrong with the power that you have? So he sent me this.
 - Q. Okay, and I mean did he tell you what was wrong with it as far as --
 - A. I can't necessarily see that there's anything wrong with it, but it didn't matter what I thought or he thought. I think at the time it mattered what Bank of America thought.

- Q. Okay, and so is he asking you to prepare a new power of attorney?
- A. I don't recall whether he asked me to do that or, you know, I said well we can prepare a new one if what they need is original ink and original stamp and you've got one that appears to be perfectly valid here, and it's common in Vermont to record a copy of a power of attorney in a real estate transaction, for example, so it was a -- you have the power. Let's try and feed Bank of America the food it has ordered.
- Q. Okay. I'm going to show you what I have marked as exhibit 8. This appears to be a letter to -- that you wrote to John September 29th of 2015?
 - A. It is that.
 - Q. And what's the purpose of this letter to John?
- 16 A. I'm reading it.
 - Q. Okay. I think this is a -- it's advice to him, but it is somewhat self serving. I'd become concerned, we have gone two days, I can't see you have recorded anything, we have done a power of attorney here. This seems to be wandering a bit. I want it -- I want to make some record that I have told you that you ought to record this, and I'm sure I had advised him in our first conversation that if he had any doubts about what the tax consequences, the implications for the attribution of

basis in this real property might be, he should seek the advice of an accountant. So I'm making the record that was advice that I had given.

- Q. Okay. That you could not forecast with precision the tax or Medicaid eligibility results, for example, that may occur as a result of the transfers?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. You were also advising him to record the deed that was executed on June 25, 2015, is that right, in the last paragraph?
- A. I have told him what the risks were if he did not. I think the letter speaks for itself.
- Q. So that -- and you said it should be recorded so that they would have priority over claims of third parties, correct?
- A. Garden variety advice. If a deed has been given to property and the grantee fails to record it and the third party doesn't know about it and somebody comes in and records something, then you've lost your place in line.
- Q. Okay. So you didn't have any particular third parties in mind?
 - A. I certainly did not.
- Q. Okay. Did you ever discuss the tax or Medicaid eligibility issues with Eleanor at any time?

- Not in any detail, no. There were cursory 1 2 conversations that we had when I met with her to try to 3 give me sufficient confidence that she was making eye contact, knew why she was here, knew who John was, knew 4 5 what she was signing. They were brief visits, but she 6 was, as I say, feeble but with it enough to, you know, get 7 in the car and have John take her down here or leave the house and do that and was -- he didn't have to stick her 8 9 with anything. She's awake and appears to me to be alert, 10 not on the snooze or the nod, but we didn't have any deep discussion about tax consequences. Frankly, the tax 11 12 consequences of the transaction are likely of more concern 13 to John and Medicaid eligibility perhaps of interest to 14 her, but that falls on the generation below ordinarily 15 with no surviving spouse.
 - Q. So did you discuss the Medicaid eligibility issues with Eleanor at any time?
 - A. No I did not. Only with John.
 - Q. Okay.

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- A. And then in the briefest way having told him that I am not expert in those matters.
- Q. Exhibit --
- A. I will expand on that.
- 24 | Q. Okay.
- 25 A. The notes in those opening conversations about

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what the extent of her assets were, were probably a poke in the direction of trying to be sure that there wasn't an obvious problem with eligibility or what kind of and the amount of assets she had on hand, and then once the amounts proved to be modest enough to not really light it up for me, stop, we got to do something different here, I just proceeded.

- Q. Okay. Exhibit 9 appears to be a letter from you to John dated January 22nd of 2016?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And enclosing a cover letter to the city clerk; is that right?
- A. That's correct, and that's because the deed done back in April had not been recorded and I had given him a recording letter at the time. It hadn't been used and I didn't want to my letter to be of stale date. Okay here's a new letter.
- Q. So there were -- as I understand it there were two deeds. One was executed in June, but you had prepared that in April; is that right?
 - A. Yes. That's correct.
- Q. So when you refer to the April deed you're referring to the deed that was actually executed at the end of June in 2015?
- A. That's correct I believe.

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- Q. Okay, and you were providing this cover letter to John so that he could record the deed himself?
- A. Yes. He was capable of recording the deed. I was giving him the letter so that I would -- because the letter directs the clerk to send the record deed back to me. So that's one attempt of mine at being sure that I would know if it were done.
- Q. So exhibit 10 is dated -- also dated January 22nd of 2016 and this copy is signed and this is recording the deed that was executed on June 25th of 2015; is that correct?
 - A. Yes it is.
- Q. Okay. Now is this letter -- I'm trying to understand the sequence here. Is this a letter that you sent with the original deed or did you give John the letter and then he filed the deed?
- A. I gave it to John.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. I see January 22nd. Maybe it's more accurate to say I don't recall.
- Q. Okay.
 - A. I don't.
- Q. Okay. Fair enough. In any event it does appear the deed was actually recorded on January 29th of 2016 according to the notation --

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- A. From the endorsement on the deed.
- Q. Okay, and then exhibit 11 looks like a letter that you sent to John actually enclosing the original warranty deed?
- A. It had come back -- the deed had come back to the clerk and I wrote, as is my habit, to return the original recorded instrument.
- Q. All right. Thank you. Exhibit 14 is the actual quit claim deed that was executed on June 25, 2015, and is this the one that you drove to Burlington?
 - A. As I recall, yes it is.
- Q. Okay. So how did you and John decide on the location where the deed would be executed?
 - A. I did not decide. John did.
- Q. Okay. What did he -- what did he -- where did he tell you that you would meet?
- A. As we noted from my notes we were to meet in the parking lot and then from there I got in John's car, Eleanor's car, whoever owned the car, and we drove to a nearby church. I don't recall the name of the church, but it was the Catholic church that had apparently been the family church chosen because of I think their comfort with that location.
- Q. Okay. So you met John and Eleanor at the -- at a Shaw's parking lot?

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- A. That's correct.
- Q. And then you got in their car?
- A. That's correct.
- Q. Okay, and do you remember where everybody was sitting?
- A. For the ride over to the church?
- Q. Yes.
 - A. John was driving, Eleanor was in the passenger seat, and I was in the back seat.
- Q. All right, and then you drove from there to their church; is that right?
 - A. A nearby Catholic church.
 - Q. Okay, and what happened when you got to the church?
 - A. Well that was to be the venue for the signing of this deed and I began to -- and I think this may have been my first meeting with Eleanor and I began speaking to her from the back seat. This was a little irregular and I found that wasn't working. It was a nice day so I got out of the car and went around to the passenger side and opened the door and said we ought to do something a little more direct here; had a brief conversation with her, the precise content of which I don't recall, but introduced myself, try to make her feel comfortable, ask a question about whether she -- do you understand this is a deed that

will transfer the title to your property to the joint names of you and John, and do you understand that, and a nod, and you need to speak please ma'am, and a feeble yes comes out, and she was smiling as I recall. I have a pleasant memory of that.

- Q. Where was John when this conversation --
- A. He's sitting in the driver's seat.
- Q. All right.
- A. And not really participating.
- Q. Okay, and so what conversation did you have with her to make sure that she understood the nature of what she was signing?
- A. Only a brief and direct conversation. This deed will create an estate where the property will be in the joint names and I'm not repeating verbatim and nobody was recording it, but explaining that this is a transfer of property and I understand that's what you wish to happen that the property be in joint names of you and John so that when time comes the property may be his alone, and I recall John interjecting. Apparently both were quite religious. They seemed very attentive and at ease attentive to her and desirous there be we be at this church venue where she would feel comfortable, and mom this means that when you go to heaven I can stay and keep living in the house or words to that effect, and there was

some indication of clear assent from her. So --

- Q. What was the indication of clear assent from her?
- A. The formation of the word yes in answer to my questions. It wasn't just a nod and a wink. I like to get some verbal response, some indication that this isn't some fast shuffle here, but rather that the person however feeble knows what they are doing, and it appeared to me that she did.
- Q. Okay. Did John tell you that she had been diagnosed with Alzheimer's related dementia in 2009?
- 12 | A. Never.
 - Q. Were you aware that his -- that her general physician was of the opinion that as of 2014 she would not have the capacity to execute documents of this kind?
 - A. Never.
- 17 | Q. Okay.
 - A. In fact, that appears to be a bit against the grain of what was represented to me.
 - Q. By John?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Okay. Did you have a specific discussion with John about his mother's capacity to enter -- to execute these documents?
- 25 A. In our opening interview, yes. It's always a

point of concern, you know, is she under any guardianship now, under any legal disability that you know of, and it was no she has good days and bad days, but she's okay. She knows who I am, she knows where she is, she knows where home is, she knows what she's doing. On any given day she might seem to be a little more tired or out of it than another, but -- and that was it. That's the brief test conversation, the capacity to know who you are, where you are, and what you're doing.

- Q. Okay.
 - A. And who other people are.
- Q. And -- I'm sorry?
 - A. And who other people are. She knows you,

 John, right, and she isn't going to think I'm like her

 brother when we meet.
 - Q. Okay. I mean Detective Decker in his interview with you indicated that the only word that Eleanor said to you at this meeting was yes according to you. Is that consistent -- seems to be consistent with what you're saying now in terms of her ability to understand the documents?
 - A. You know I recall more than that. I certainly couldn't repeat verbatim what she said, but there was more than just a yes, and Detective Decker -- and I recall reviewing his notes at the time -- this is a year and a

half ago when you I think sent me or somebody sent me a copy of his write-up and it seemed a little adversarial as if he were upset; no I'm not giving you anything without a court order, and you have to, no sir I don't, and so his saying that I told him that the only word she said was yes I have no recollection of a specific question like that though it might have occurred. The tenor of that first meeting might be more that did she say yes to which I responded yes.

- Q. Okay. This meeting at the parking lot at Shaw's and then in the church that's the first time that you ever met Eleanor in person; is that correct?
 - A. That I recall. That's correct.
- Q. Did you ever meet with her alone without John present?
- A. No I didn't.
- Q. Do you know why the meeting was in the parking lot of the church as opposed to at her home?
- A. No I don't. Mom likes to get out, something like that, get her out of the house at least to give her a drive, get her out because she's, you know, I guess in her early 90's at this time, and having had such experiences with my mother that seemed consistent; want to get out, fine.
 - Q. In your probate practice dealing with elderly

clients do you have a practice or routine of meeting with them alone without anybody else present?

- A. Sometimes depending on circumstances. I wouldn't say that -- my probate practice is not a daily event. These things come and go, but if I have two children in the room and I'm being told how this person wants to divide their property, then it's excuse me you folks may need to leave. I would like to hear this, but that's just based on my sense at the time.
- Q. Okay. Do you recall today any words that Eleanor may have said about the execution of the documents at the church other than the word yes?
- A. I don't recall. I know there was some conversation however brief. There was more than just yes.
 - Q. What was the conversation?
- A. It was, you know, around this event and John's attempt to explain when you go to heaven, mom, and my -- it was just more than a yes. I recall that there was some brief exchange both between Eleanor and I and between John and his mother, but no way I could swear to what its precise content was.
- Q. And so she was seated in the front seat of the vehicle when she signed the deed?
 - A. That's correct.
 - Q. And you were standing next to the car outside

the vehicle?

- A. I was kneeling a little bit. If you're standing, you can't even see. I was down to the point where I was face-to-face with her and she could have some idea to whom she was speaking and what was going on and I could collect the -- whatever assurance I felt were appropriate that she knew what she was doing. Whether she did or not --
- Q. Okay. There were other documents in addition to the deed that you executed with her that day, correct?
- A. There were though I was -- I don't think I was told that that was going to occur and I probably asked -- makes me nervous to put my signature on something and not have a copy of it for myself and asked that I be sent copies and I don't believe that ever happened, but so be that. I recall that one of them was I think for a transfer of an IRA account and I recall a conversation about that.
- Q. All right. So exhibit 15 appears to be a form from Key Bank for the liquidation of an IRA?
 - A. Yes it does.
- Q. And this is also a form that you executed in the church parking lot, correct?
 - A. Yes. That's correct.
 - Q. And when did you learn that you would be

notarizing this form?

- A. At that time. At the time of the meeting.
- Q. So what was explained to you about the reason for this?
- A. That this was a rollover IRA. That is -- I think it had resulted -- it existed because of the father's -- late John L. McDonald's contributions to some account and then it had passed to Eleanor.
 - Q. And who is telling you this?
- A. John recited it and said, you know, this is dad's IRA that you own, mom, or something like that, and this was consistent with the conversation that had happened when we met about trying to avoid the probate circumstance for this, and it sounded like there were really like only two or three items that were out there for -- to enable and avoid probate; the house, bank account in sole name, and this, and there were other items that were jointly titled. I did not inquire deeply about what they might have been. So this was -- though I had no idea I would be asked to notarize this, it had been mentioned before. So in that respect it was not a complete surprise.
- Q. Was it explained to you why it was being cashed out as opposed to -- let me ask this question first. Do you know whether Eleanor was already listed as

a beneficiary on this IRA?

- A. No I don't, but I guess I thought that she was the owner of it.
 - Q. She was already the owner of it, right?
- A. That's what I think I understood, yes, but nobody at Key Bank had told me that.
- Q. All right. So this form was so it could be cashed out; is that correct?
 - A. That's correct. It was to enable liquidation.
- Q. Okay, and what conversation did you have with Eleanor about this liquidation?
- A. Another brief conversation as I looked it over and said if you sign this, this is going to give your son John the right to cash this account out. Do you understand that, and I got a yes. I had to get something or sorry game is over we're not going to be able to proceed. Yes I understand that, and it's your wish that he be able to do that? You're doing this voluntarily?

 Yes. And that conversation probably was just that brief.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. But there was a prompt response not -- she wasn't lolling her head around and saying yes to the roof of the car. She was looking at me.
- Q. Did you talk about the taxes that would be withheld or anything like that?

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| 1 | A. No, but John seemed to be aware that there was |
| 2 | going to be a tax implication. I explained to John at |
| 3 | some point that this money has never been taxed. This is |
| 4 | everybody's surprise if they don't know what's going on |
| 5 | when your parent's retirement account comes to them or |
| 6 | comes to the survivor. Well good. Not exactly. It's |
| 7 | only partly good. |
| 8 | Q. Right. Did you ever tell Eleanor that she |
| 9 | would be taxed on the amount of the payout? Did you |
| 10 | consider that to be your role? |
| 11 | A. I guess it was clear to me that John knew that |
| | |

- A. I guess it was clear to me that John knew that that was going to happen and it also seemed clear enough that Eleanor was not -- whatever else she was concerned about she's not deeply worried with her tax circumstance at this particular stage in her life. This would have a tax consequence. I did not have a direct conversation with her about the tax consequences of cashing it out.
- Q. And there was a third document that you executed at the car as I understand it. Show you what I have had marked as exhibit 17.

MR. LANGROCK: Is there a 16?

MR. HUGHES: These are out of order because I'm my own paralegal.

BY MR. HUGHES:

Q. So exhibit 17 appears to be a living trust

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document. Yes?

- A. Uh-huh. Yes it does.
- Q. Okay. Is this the trust document that in your notes early on that indicated that it wasn't your responsibility to prepare?
 - A. I don't know.
 - Q. Did you prepare this document?
 - A. No I didn't.
- Q. All right. Was this document presented to you in the church parking lot?
- A. It must have been because it is the same date,
 but as I say no copies. Just by request of what else I
 signed were there and it was a nice car, but it didn't
 have a copying machine in it.
 - Q. Do you know when that document was presented to you to be executed by Eleanor?
 - A. Do I know when?
 - Q. When it was?
 - A. Would you repeat the question?
 - Q. Sure. When was this document given to you so that Eleanor could execute it in your presence?
 - A. Presumably at the church parking lot on the 25th day of June since it's dated the same day as the deed and the IRA liquidation and authorization.
 - Q. Do you remember any conversation that day

either with John or with Eleanor about this living trust document?

- A. I have no specific recollection. I'm sure it was more than sign this too. I'm seeing it for the first time. I read through it and say all right this is a trust document. The sole beneficiary appears to be John J. and so you understand what this does and the effect and this all seemed and yes I do were the responses again, and none of this appeared inconsistent with the way the whole circumstance had been described to me beginning with her telephone conversations in February and our meeting in April that we want to avoid probate and I'm to be the beneficiary and so on.
 - Q. Your phone conversations with John?
 - A. Yes with John. That's correct.
- Q. But you don't remember specifically what you told Eleanor about this living trust document?
- A. Specifically no. I'm sure that I explained to her what my cursory understanding of the document was after looking at it. I certainly did not ask her to sign it without having some awareness of what it was.
- Q. And what words did she say to you to indicate that she understood what the document was?
 - A. Either yes or I do.
 - Q. Did you ever ask her to explain, for example,

what she thought that the quit claim deed meant or what this living trust document meant?

- A. Not that I recall.
- Q. Okay. How long did the meeting at the church parking lot last?
- A. Perhaps 15 minutes or so. Maybe 20. It might not have been that long, but I was presented with some new stuff to sign and took time enough to believe I understood what they were.
- Q. Okay, and after the documents were executed what did you do?
- A. After they were executed then I got back in the back seat and, you know, passed a kind greeting. I know that Eleanor handed me a little bag with some Lake Champlain chocolates in it, and I remember that because I like them and thank you very much and there was a goodbye and held her hand and I got in the back seat, John drove me back to where my vehicle was, and I proceeded back to my office.
- Q. Why did you meet at Shaw's instead of directly at the church?
- A. Because I told John you need to give me an easy place to find you because -- we'll meet at the church. Well I -- and is there some place nearby that I'll be able to find easily when I get off the interstate

or something because I'm sorry I'm just not completely fluent with the addresses. I come up here from time to time for transactions, but then it's turn around and go. So that was just a place that would be convenient for me to be able to find him.

- Q. Do you remember any other conversations that you had with Eleanor that we haven't already talked about on June 25, 2015?
 - A. I have no specific memory. No.
- 10 Q. All right. I would like to take a short break.
- 12 (Recess.)
- 13 | BY MR. HUGHES:
 - Q. After June 25, 2015 when is the next time that you saw Eleanor McDonald?
 - A. I don't recall exactly. Sometime in the fall.
 - Q. I'm going to show you what I have marked as exhibit 14A and is this the quit claim deed from Eleanor and John to John solely?
 - A. Yes it is.
 - Q. All right, and did John indicate to you why he wanted this document executed?
 - A. I think, as I described, he had not yet recorded the other one. I'm sure I told him that the way this is drafted usually going to have to record them both

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because you're both named as grantors here. So this is as if that joint tenancy had been created, but as I explained earlier he was -- told me that he was responding to his mother's desire to have him be more assertive with his sisters --

- Q. Okay.
- A. -- and thought this might advance that cause.
- Q. All right, and it appears this was executed on September 29th of 2015?
- A. It does appear so.
- Q. Is that consistent with your recollection of when it happened?
 - A. It really doesn't matter what I recall.
- Q. Okay.
- 15 A. That's the date on the document.
- 16 Q. Is that when you executed the document?
- A. I have never executed a document and put anything other than the date on it ever.
 - Q. Okay. Between June 25th of 2015 and when this deed was executed what conversations did you have with Eleanor McDonald?
 - A. I think none.
 - Q. And where was this document executed?
 - A. This was done in White River Junction I recall and I presume that's what it says. Yes. At Hartford. So

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this was done at my office. John drove to my office.

- Q. All right, and who made the appointment?
- A. John did.
- Q. And did Eleanor come into your office to execute documents?
 - A. No. I never saw Eleanor leave the car.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. And that happens if not frequently, you know, from time to time. She didn't appear to be in a condition to -- she didn't look like she was going to get out and hop around any, but she also appeared to remember me.
- 12 | Q. Okay.
 - A. I have no idea whether she did or not.
 - Q. What did she say that indicated that she --
 - A. Oh hello. Some greeting of some sort. Some smile. Some look of recognition or what I took to be so.
 - Q. Was this the same car that you met her in --
- 18 A. Yes it was.
 - Q. -- in the church parking lot? Yes?
 - A. I didn't meet her in the church parking lot.

 I drove to the lot.
 - Q. I understand that, but was this the same car that she was sitting in when the deeds were executed in June?
- 25 A. Yes it was.

- Q. So how did you know to come out to the parking lot to execute this deed with Eleanor?
- A. Well John had told me he was coming, I presume, and then they came and the parking lot is a space that's right in front of my office.
- Q. Okay, and was John -- where was John when this deed was executed?
- A. I think back in the driver's seat by then. I mean I didn't -- I don't stand there at the window waiting for reasons to come out and greet who may drive in. So he would have come in and said we're here, good, and I presume I knew why they were there and we're going to go out and do this second deed --
- Q. Okay.
 - A. -- and so we did.
- Q. So what conversation did you have with Eleanor before she signed this deed?
- A. Without precision Eleanor this is another deed like the one we signed a couple of months back, but this one puts the property into John's name alone so that he will control the property when you sign this. Do you understand that? I remember an answer and she gave one yes or I do. I don't recall what.
- Q. Okay.
- 25 A. As with the court reporter, a grunt or a noise

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is not what I take as a murmur of assent. I want a word.

- Q. Right. Did you have any other conversation with her about the deed before she signed it on September?
 - A. Not that I recall, sir.
- Q. Okay. I'm showing you what I have marked as exhibit 17A. Can you identify that document?
- A. Power of attorney document prepared by me signed September 29, 2015.
 - O. And was --
- 10 A. Notarized by me with my assistant Jill Chase 11 as the witness.
 - Q. All right, and was this document signed by Eleanor in the front seat of the car as well?
- 14 | A. Yes.
 - Q. At the same time?
 - A. As I said Eleanor never left the front seat of the car.
 - Q. Okay. Did she appear to you to be physically incapable of leaving the car?
 - A. I don't know that. I don't know that she was incapable. I mean if it had caught on fire I wouldn't be surprised to have seen her find a way out, but I guess I have no opinion about whether she was incapable. She was certainly more comfortable where she was.
 - Q. How would you describe her physical appearance

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on that day?

- A. Frail would be the best I could say.
- Q. Did you have any discussions with Eleanor about the potential Medicaid implications of this quit claim deed in September?
 - A. No.
- Q. And how long did the meeting last in front of your office on September 29, 2015?
- A. Oh quite brief. I expect maybe 10, 15 minutes tops.
- Q. Do you know when the next time you saw Eleanor McDonald was after that September 29th meeting?
- A. Some time I think after the calendar turned.

 Seems to me there was a Catholic Diocese Advance Directive of some sort that was tended to and I don't think that happened on this date in September.
- Q. Exhibit 16 is that the advance directive that you're talking about?
 - A. Yup.
- Q. Appears to be dated February 4th of 2016?
- 21 | A. It does.
- 22 Q. Where was this signed?
- A. Same place, at my office in White River
 Junction; by again automobile --
- 25 Q. Okay.

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- A. -- was the setting. She did not leave the car.
- Q. And what discussions did you have with Eleanor about the advance directive before she signed it?
- A. You know what. I seldom have much discussion about these things. Other attorneys have different practices. I'll expand by saying that when a client comes in for a plain vanilla will appointment, then will, general power of attorney, advance directive, those are the three principal points, if there's nothing complicated going on, I'll give you the name of a web site. I am not going to help you fill out your advance directive. I'm not a doctor. You make your choices. You speak with your primary caregiver. You speak with your -- whatever your religious affiliation may be, if any, and then I'll witness your signature if you want, but I'm not telling you whether you should or could or might or ought. No part of it. So we were there to witness her signature.
 - Q. And that's it? And that's it?
 - A. That was pretty much it. Yes, sir.
- Q. So you didn't go over the specific instructions contained within the document with her?
- A. No I did not.
- 24 | Q. Okay.
- 25 A. I witnessed her signature. It does not ask me

to pass any judgment about anything.

- Q. Okay. Did you talk with her about who was being appointed under the advance directive?
 - A. I don't recall. Very possibly not.
 - Q. Or who the backup was?
- A. No. I think I happen to recall it was Andrew whom I do not know, but no I did not. I witnessed her signature.
- Q. And do you recall what her physical condition was in February when this document was executed?
- A. I don't think I noticed any real significant difference among these meetings. She was -- no I don't recall any difference. Frail, but friendly and present and accounted for was what I thought. She knew she was there. She knew she was signing something. In this case it didn't mean do you know what this is. There's no particular duty on me at this point. I think I asked John so why are you here to do this and I don't recall the answer except to the effect well she knows you and she's comfortable with you and there's nothing frightening or threatening about it. So --
- Q. So John drove her to your office for the sole purpose of executing this advance directive?
- A. I think perhaps -- I don't recall if there was any other reason, but unless you have another document

that I signed on that date I think that is possible.

- Q. I should be more specific because you obviously don't know what else John was planning for that day, but as far as your involvement goes this was the only thing that he asked you to do? Yes?
- A. Yes. By this point the deed deal was done because that was January of 2016. So that's been taken care of and I guess it hadn't been returned to him yet because that didn't happen until March or so when I sent it back and the clerk sent it back. I don't think there was much else on the plate at this point.
- Q. Are you aware or did you follow up with John at all about the recording of the September 29th deed?
- A. I'm sure we had conversations because you saw my letter wondering so how many deeds are we going to do here, which way is it going to tumble, but it was all against the backdrop of this -- as it was recited to me the upset that was being caused by sisters' visits and the criticism John was getting from his mother about their interventions and his struggle with whether he was going to have to be more firm than I suspect he cared to be with his sisters about what were described to me as intrusions.
- Q. But as I understand it you did not have any discussions with Eleanor McDonald before, during, or after the signing of the advance directive on February 4, 2016?

- A. Gee I can't imagine that we did not speak at all. This was the third time or so that I had seen the woman and she seemed like a kind soul. So I'm sure there was a greeting of some sort, but we didn't have any discussion about the document. I imagine that this is an advance directive for health care. It's a Catholic church form, but I'm not required to go through a drill with her about do you understand the choices you have made here about whether or not medication will be withheld or anything like that. I'm just not going there.
 - Q. Okay. Do you know the next time that you saw Eleanor after the advance directive was signed?
 - A. Not offhand.
- Q. Okay. You saw her at least one other time that I'm aware of?
 - A. I believe I may have, but I don't remember the date.
 - Q. Okay. I'm going to show you document that I have marked as exhibit 13.
 - A. Oh yes.
 - Q. This appears to be the document that you referred to earlier revoking Patricia Sundberg's power of attorney; is that correct?
 - A. Yes. This refreshes my recollection.
 - Q. All right, and you said that I believe John

McDonald prepared this document?

- A. Yes after a discussion that he had with me about, you know, what do I need to do here, and I guess it was -- I don't know if it was the bank that had -- when John presented. I don't know so I won't say anything further, but I did meet with Eleanor on 30 March.
 - Q. And where did you meet with her?
- A. As with the previous two meetings this was at my office in White River Junction.
 - Q. Okay, and was this also in the parking lot?
- A. It was. He would park the car immediately out front of my office. There's no distance, so came out the door and greeted her there.
- Q. Had you spoken with Eleanor McDonald since the advance directive was signed and before the revocation of the power of attorney was signed?
 - A. No, sir.
 - Q. All right.
- A. I had not.
- Q. And what discussion did you have with Eleanor about the revocation of the power of attorney?
- A. Only the brief discussion of do you understand that by signing this you are revoking any power of attorney that was given to your daughter Patricia -- Patty. Yes I do, and that didn't seem remarkable to me

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since I had seen what appeared to be a properly executed 2011 -- 2011 power of attorney to John as agent from his mother as principal. So I think until very near in time to this March 30th date when I notarized this I wasn't aware that there was any other power of attorney out there.

- Q. Other than the one that you had executed giving to John --
- A. Right which seemed to me just a duplication of what was already in existence essentially.
- Q. So she signed this in your presence then in Hartford, Vermont?
 - A. That's correct.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. White River Junction is a village within the Town of Hartford. So this too was signed at my office on 30 March.
- Q. Okay. I would like to show you what I have marked as exhibit 12 which appears to me to be the same document except without your notary seal on it; is that correct? Had you ever seen that document?
 - A. Uh-huh. I will give you my guess.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. And that is that this notariture on the bottom appears to be something that ran through the old fashioned

thing called a typewriter in our office, and we probably put that notariture on there and this was what it is that we did. I haven't compared these two. They appear to be quite identical absent the notariture on one of them.

Q. Is it something she had signed before you notarized it or did you go in and type the notary line after she had signed it?

- A. I don't recall.
- Q. All right. Did you have any conversations with Eleanor McDonald after March 30, 2016?
 - A. I think I can confidently say no now.
- 12 | Q. Okay.
- MR. LANGROCK: Is this a good time to take a break?
- MR. HUGHES: Sure.
- 16 (Recess.)
- 17 | BY MR. HUGHES:
 - Q. After the power of attorney revocation was done do you remember any further conversations with John McDonald?
 - A. Yes. I think as my note showed and you refreshed me then around I think it said April 22nd or something, but there was a conversation or two after that, maybe just the one, about some events around Easter and his sister having called the police and things apparently

coming to a head, and then as we also recall it was the 9th day of May or something when Walter Decker contacted me and visited me at the office.

- Q. Have you spoken to John at all since the guardianship was entered?
- A. No. I think that note of the conversation of late April was the last time and then my note showed, if I recall, that I had tried to return a call to him on May 5th and May 9th, 2016, but neither time did I contact him and I have had no contact of any description since then.
- Q. Have you talked to Mr. Langrock at all since then?
 - A. I don't believe so.
 - Q. Or anyone from that office?
- A. No. I think you are the only person to whom I've spoken other than, again, to Decker I guess to follow up with him after you got the court order or he did, whomever did, that made me feel comfortable about it after my chat with bar counsel. So --
- Q. So is it your position that Eleanor was your client throughout this process?
 - A. I think so. Yes.
- Q. And did you ever have any correspondence from Eleanor?
- A. No I never did. She didn't -- as you can see

70 her signature is pretty wobbly. I doubt Eleanor -- this 1 is a gratuitous comment, but I don't see she's likely to 2 3 be corresponding with anybody. Her handwriting seemed to be too enfeebled. She had the look of having some 4 5 rheumatoid arthritis going on. Her hands were not comfortable. 6 7 Ο. Other than some of the invoices did you send her any correspondence directly? 8 9 Α. No. 10 And you never met alone with her, correct? Q. That's correct. 11 Α. 12 MR. HUGHES: All right. That's all that 13 I have. Thank you. MR. LANGROCK: Just a few questions to 14 15 follow up. 16 EXAMINATION BY MR. LANGROCK: 17 18 Q. You and I have had no discussions concerning this case at all, have we? 19 20 No, sir. BY MR. LANGROCK:

- Q. Fair.
- A. Thanks.
- Q. Let me ask you when you talked to Mr. Decker did you have a feeling he was rather antagonistic towards my client?
- A. Yes it seemed so, but that would be just tone the voice. He wasn't making overt criticisms, but he was bird dogging it.
- Q. When you were in the church parking lot and Eleanor signed the documents how physically did she sign them, on the dashboard or her lap?
- A. In her lap and I had a file with me so I put that underneath the document to provide it some stability.
- Q. If I understand correctly from your notes, when you first met with him there were three main assets; one was the house, one was the -- a small IRA that had been the father's, and then there was another fairly substantial bank account?
- A. I think my notes that I saw that I noticed did mention those three; bank account I think I had \$96,000 written next to that, and then for some reason I recall the note said about \$12,000 and I think it said life insurance next to my note, and whether that's the same thing as the IRA or not I don't know or whether I made a

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mistake in notation.

- Q. In all your conversations with John did he ever suggest at any time that the \$96,000 account should be transferred to his name?
 - A. Should be transferred?
 - Q. To his name?
 - A. No.
- Q. Did he explain to you the background of the Bank of America IRA of his father in terms of his name being on it?
- A. No I don't believe he did. I don't recall that he did.
- Q. Leaving that aside the only thing that he ever suggested his mother wanted was the house and to the trust the contents of the house would go to him when she died?
- A. That was the principle objective of his coming to me I think. Yes.
- Q. And in your conversations with Eleanor and with him do you feel confident that that was her desire?

 That was what she wanted?
 - A. It seemed to be so. Yes.
- Q. If you had any doubt in that, would you have completed the transaction?
- 24 | A. No.
 - Q. The second deed from both of them to John that

was I think you said prepared as a result of the conflict he was having with his sisters? I inferred so from John's comments to me. was struggling with how he was going to be able to control the environment at the house and described it as something his mother wished. Clearly he was not looking forward to any set-to with his sisters whether his mother wished it or not. MR. LANGROCK: That's all I have. MR. HUGHES: Great. Nothing further. Thank you. (Whereupon, the proceeding was adjourned at 11 a.m.)
