Referral Guidelines for Judges and court staff (Also checklist for parent coordinators)

**Bold= "most appropriate for referral"**

## Substance abuse issues

- Allegations of alcohol or substance abuse
- DWI record
- Treatment for alcohol or substance abuse

## Signs of parent/child alienation

- Discussion of court proceedings
- "bad mouthing" the other parent
- False predictions of future relationship
- Lying to the child(dren) about the other parent
- Ongoing court hearings

## Parent Coordination may **NOT** be appropriate

- When one parent files motions claiming the other parent is not following court orders
- When either parent lacks either the capacity or the willingness to participate in parent coordination
- When there are repeated violations of RFA orders
- When there are continuing threats of violence

NOTE: Parent Coordinators do not make recommendations on parental rights and responsibilities. A temporary or final order for PR&R must be in place prior to ordering Parent Coordination.
